Message from the Town Manager

Dear Neighbor,

The Town continues to move toward October 15th Special Town Meeting, and the <u>warrant</u> should be arriving at your homes in the coming days. The articles include the acquisition of Broadacres Farm, potential reconstruction of the <u>Fairbank</u> Community Center and the re-use of the <u>Melone</u> property on North Road. Town employees and citizen petitioners are working diligently to prepare the articles for presentation, and I hope to see many of you at our Special Town Meeting.

In recent months, Town staff has had great success with applying for and securing grants. Through the work of

the Planning Department, the Town has received funding for hazard mitigation planning, vulnerability planning and partial acquisition of the CSX Rail Trail. Through the diligence of the Fire staff, the Town received a SAFER grant for four new fire fighters. This funding allows us to do important planning and tasks with a smaller impact on our tax levy, and I applaud our team for their commitment to this community.

I would like to applaud the Sudbury
Historical Society, who will be breaking
ground on the Loring Parsonage
construction project this month. SHS
has worked diligently to raise money to
build a historical museum, and in a partnership with
the Town, is beginning this project.

In the coming months, the Town will begin our preparation for May Town Meeting, namely finalizing our capital plan and formalizing our FY20 Operating Budget.

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From the Selectmen's Office


September 11

The Board of Selectmen opened in executive session to discuss collective bargaining for town engineers (later approved in open session) and matters pertaining to Sudbury Station. They then moved to open session where they approved a Common Victualler license for Peet's Coffee, which will open a location at Meadow Walk. They discussed the Melone Disposition of Real Property RFP and voted to move forward with negotiating a development agreement with Quarry North to be put before **Special Town** Meeting. They also discussed Special Town Meeting articles and assigned authors for "pro" and "con" arguments to be drafted for the ballot questions at the November 6, 2018 Election. Upon the recommendation of Conservation and Park & Recreation Commission, the Board declined to purchase property on Barton Drive.

They accepted \$726,000 raised by the Sudbury Historical Society to be used for repurposing the Loring Parsonage as a Sudbury History Center and Museum. They also declared Sunday, September 30, 2018 as "Goodbye Little Dude Day" in Sudbury.

September 25

The Board opened in Executive Session to discuss matters pertaining to Sudbury Station, Melone and Broadacres Farm. They continued to Open Session, where they heard a presentation on Town Meeting Article 4 (420 Lincoln Road) from LSRHS Superintendent Bella Wong. They also discussed Town Meeting, signed off on a land sale voted at a past town meeting and discussed their 2018 meeting schedule.





OCTOBER 15, 2018 TOWN MEETING Article 1:

Melone Property Disposition

An Opportunity to Preserve our Historic Town Center.

Sudbury Station is a large scale, 250-unit apartment complex currently planned for the middle of our cherished town center. The developer has offered to **give to town the Sudbury Station parcel and 1 million dollars in exchange for the Melone property on North Road (Rt. 117)**. The new project would be called Quarry North.

The Board of Selectmen voted in favor of Quarry North on September 11, 2018. Town committees and departments have overwhelmingly recommended Quarry North.

At the **October 15 Special Town Meeting**, the Town will consider this project. Disposition of property is considered only at Town Meeting and not on the ballot.

PUBLIC SAFETY

"In terms of overall safety, the relocation of the Sudbury Station Project to the Melone Property would be the most prudent decision. The safety of our citizens, especially the children, is our top priority." - Chief Nix, Sudbury Police

Facts about the Quarry North Proposal:

- Eliminates the proposed 250-unit Sudbury Station apartment complex and ends **expensive litigation costs.**
- Sudbury acquires 40 acres of invaluable land in our historic town center.
- The Quarry North location (Melone) has been deemed by public safety officials to be a **safer location for a housing development** than our Historic Town Center.

SUDBURY STATION LITIGATION AT HAC

It is very rare for a town to prevail in the Housing Appeals Committee (HAC). Furthermore, there is no opportunity to reduce the number of units at Sudbury Station or negotiate mitigation. If the HAC approves Sudbury Station, then all 250 units will be approved with no mitigation.

The Town is defending the Zoning Board of Appeals from an appeal by the developer at the Housing Appeals Committee.

WILL THERE BE A TRAFFIC STUDY BEFORE WE VOTE?

Yes. The Town is in the process of conducting its own traffic study, and we are working to have the traffic study results and the preliminary mitigation recommendations incorporated into the development agreement and available BEFORE town meeting.

DO WE NEED A NEW FIRE STATION #3?

Fire Station #3 was built in 1954 and has never been updated. It will need to be updated primarily to allow for female firefighters and general renovation independent of this project.

The vehicle bay capacity for Fire Station #3 will not need to be increased because of Sudbury Station or Quarry North.

CAN WE REDUCE THE NUMBER OF UNITS?

The Quarry North negotiations are confidential but there is an opportunity to negotiate aspects of the development such as the number of units or the ratio of town homes to apartment units.

For Sudbury Station there is NO opportunity to reduce the number of units.

MITIGATING IMPACT ON OUR TOWN

Whether the development goes in at Sudbury Station or Quarry North, there will be impact on our town. Only the Quarry North proposal gives the Town leverage to mitigate those impacts through a **Development Agreement**. There will be no mitigation and no development agreement for the Sudbury Station project because it is being built under an adversarial 40B Comprehensive Permit process.

Potential areas for discussion in the development agreement for Quarry North are traffic mitigation, pedestrian safety, public safety, unit count, types of units, mitigation for schools and other departments, utility and infrastructure improvements, community benefits, etc.

Broadacres Farm

Protecting our open space, character and history

Broadacres Farm is an active 34-acre horse farm with stables, pasture, indoor arena, and riding fields located on both sides of scenic Morse Road. The property has abundant natural and cultural resources, is connected to other Townowned properties, and offers potential for recreational use. It is a priority for protection identified in the 2009-2015 Open Space and Recreation Plan and the Heritage Landscape Inventory of 2006.

The Board of Selectmen is currently negotiating the purchase of the property and working towards an agreement that will be considered at **Town Meeting on October 15**th. The purchase, which will require bonding and a debt exclusion, will also be up for a vote on the **November 8 Election** ballot.

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

- Water -one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days for drinking and sanitation
- Food at least a three-day supply of nonperishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a

NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both

- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Local maps

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A New Way to Help Your Neighbors

Several months ago, the Board of Health Social Worker met with the Sudbury Clergy
Association. It was discussed that there are often various unmet needs within the community and the Clergy Association asked how they could help. They then suggested that the Social Worker email the group each week with unmet needs, and they offered to help in any way they could. As the word got out amongst congregants and others in town, stakeholders asked the Social Worker to develop an online sign up platform that could be shared with anyone in town who may be interested in helping their neighbors.



A *Sign Up Genius* link was created to post resident needs, listing everything from clothing, household good and baby items, to used cars, laptops and needed services. Residents are eligible to be on the list after a thorough assessment by the town Social Worker and first accessing all other available resources. The link

For residents who have items to donate, please check out the website as often as you would like. This is a wonderful way to help neighbors, and also supports Sudbury's ongoing green initiative by encouraging upcycling.

Recount of the Massachusetts' 3rd Congressional District

Friday, September 14, The Town of Sudbury participated in the recount of the Massachusetts' 3rd District Congressional Votes from the September 4 State Primary Election. In Sudbury, Precinct 1 is represented by Massachusetts' 3rd Congressional District. Sudbury's results remained unchanged from the original State Primary results.

Special Town Meeting

State Election

The State Election will be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2018, at two locations. Precincts 1, 1A, 2 & 5 voted at the Fairbank Community Center, 40 Fairbank Road, and Precincts 3 & 4 voted at the Town Hall, 322 Concord Road. The polls are open from 7 AM to 8 PM.

Early Voting

Early Voting will be available for the November 6 State Election October 22 through November 2. Please check the <u>website</u> for updated information during the coming weeks.

Absentee Ballots

Absentee Voting Applications will still be available for registered voters who qualify. Voters who will be absent from their city or town on Election Day, or have a disability that prevents them from going to the polls, or have a religious belief preventing the same, are legally allowed to vote by absentee ballot.

Voter Registration

Regardless of whether a voter wants to take advantage of early voting, vote absentee or vote at the polls on Election Day, the first step is making sure you are registered.
