



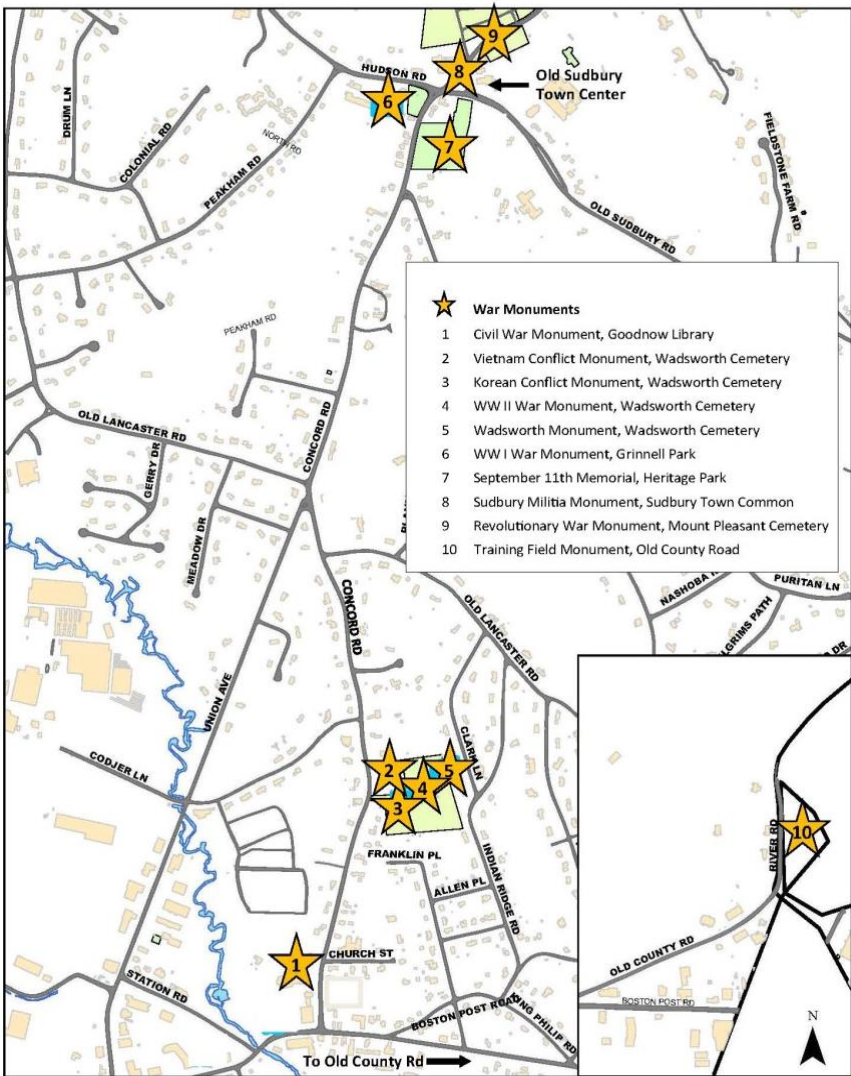

# Wadsworth Monument

## Location:

Wadsworth Cemetery  
Concord Road, Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

Tuesday, November 23, 1852 at 10:00 am

## Commemorates:

The Wadsworth Monument commemorates the Battle of Green Hill on April 21, 1676<sup>i</sup> when Captain Samuel Wadsworth and 28 soldiers lost their lives in a day long battle with Philip of Pokanoket and more than 1,000 braves (King Philip's War 1675-1676).<sup>ii</sup>

## Inscription:

THIS MONUMENT IS ERECTED BY THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS AND THE TOWN OF SUDBURY IN GRATEFUL REMEMBRANCE OF THE SERVICES AND SUFFERINGS OF THE FOUNDERS OF THE STATE; AND ESPECIALLY IN HONOR OF  
CAPT. S. WADSWORTH OF MILTON,  
CAPT. BROCKLEBANK OF ROWLEY,  
LIEUT. SHARP OF BROOKLINE,  
AND TWENTY SIX OTHERS, MEN OF THEIR COMMAND, WHO FELL NEAR THIS SPOT ON THE 18TH OF APRIL 1676, WHILE DEFENDING THE FRONTIER SETTLEMENTS AGAINST THE ALLIED INDIAN FORCES OF PHILIP OF POKANOKET.  
1852

## Other Facts:

- The Monument consists of 3 blocks of granite set one above the other which forms the base. On top of that is a tapering shaft which rises 21 feet and 6 inches above ground level.<sup>iii</sup>
- The stone slate in front of the Monument is the original marker for the mass grave laid in approximately 1730 by Captain Wadsworth's son, Harvard College President Benjamin Wadsworth.<sup>iv</sup>
- The Monument was designed after a monument in Lucca, Italy and was dedicated during a snow storm.<sup>v</sup>
- The Wadsworth Monument appears on Sudbury's Town Seal.<sup>vi</sup>

# Training Field Monument

## Location:

Old County Road, Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

Sunday, November 1, 1914

## Commemorates:

The Training Field Monument commemorates the 1720 training field used by the Sudbury Militia.<sup>vii</sup>

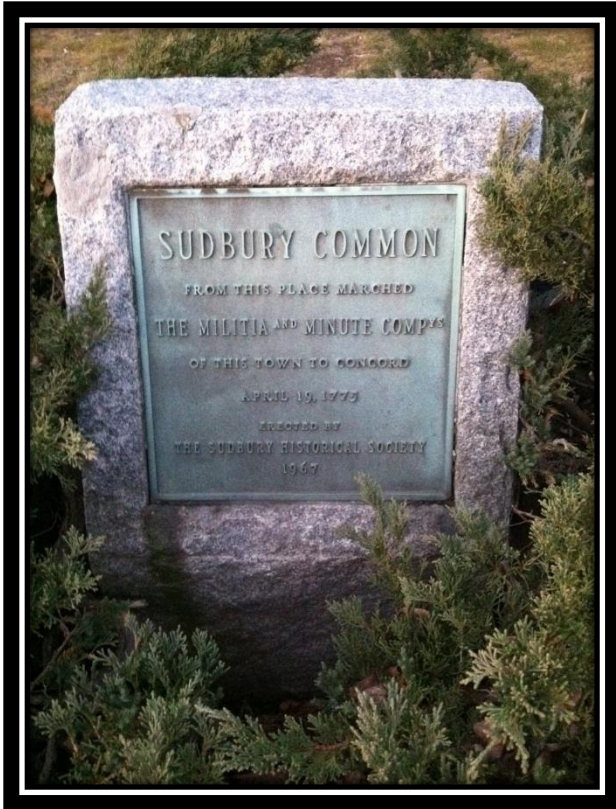

## Other Facts:

- The stone was a gift from the field of F.F. Walker of Glenbower (Walker) Farm on Goodman's Hill Road in South Sudbury and was reportedly from a wall that was built by a Revolutionary War Soldier.<sup>viii</sup>
- It is rumored that Deacon Josiah Haynes hid 50 barrels of beef, 100 barrels of flour, 20 casks of rice, 10 hogheads of molasses, 10 hogheads of rum, 500 candles, 15,000 canteens, 1,500 iron pots plus hatchets and spades in the area when supplies were moved from Concord to surrounding towns to protect them from British Troops. He died on April 19, 1775 and the supplies were never found.<sup>ix</sup>
- Ownership of the land was in dispute for many years. The Town appears to have acquired land in the late 1970s.<sup>x</sup>
- In 1975, Sudbury resident, David Gottberg restored the Monument and built a display case for the area as part of his Eagle Scout Project.<sup>xi</sup>

# Sudbury Militia Monument

## Location:

Sudbury Town Common  
On Old Sudbury Road (Route 27), Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

1967

## Commemorates:

This Monument honors the Sudbury Militia and Minutemen that marched to Concord on April 19, 1775.

## Inscription:

SUDBURY COMMON

FROM THIS PLACE MARCHED  
THE MILITIA AND MINUTE COMPYS  
OF THIS TOWN TO CONCORD  
APRIL 19, 1775

ERECTED BY  
THE SUDBURY HISTORICAL SOCIETY  
1967

## Other Facts:

- The Permanent Landscape Commission granted The Sudbury Historical Society permission to place the granite Militia Monument on the Town Common in 1967.<sup>xii</sup>
- Sudbury lost 2 residents on April 19, 1775 - Deacon Josiah Haynes and Asahel Read. Haynes was 80 years old and was killed at Lexington by a musket bullet. He is reportedly buried in the "Old Burying Ground" in Sudbury.<sup>xiii</sup>

# Revolutionary War Monument

## Location:

Mount Pleasant Cemetery  
Concord Road, Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

Wednesday, June 17, 1896 at 1:00 pm (Bunker Hill Day)

## Commemorates:

The Revolutionary War Monument honors the more than 400 Soldiers and Sailors of Sudbury who fought in the Revolutionary War (1775-1783).<sup>xiv</sup>

## Inscription:

## Other Facts:

- The pedestal is made from Quincy granite and the Soldier is carved of Westerly, RI granite. The Monument stands 17 feet above the foundation and weighs over 19 tons<sup>xv</sup>
- The funds for the Monument were donated by Joanna Gleason with a matching donation from the Town.<sup>xvi</sup>

# Civil War Monument

## Location:

Goodnow Library  
21 Concord Road, Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

Monday, May 31, 1897 at 2:00 pm (Memorial Day)

## Commemorates:

The Monument honors the 11 Sudbury men who died and the other 157 Sudbury men who fought in the Civil War (1861-1865).<sup>xvii</sup>

## Inscription:

## Other Facts:

- The Monument consists of a pedestal of Quincy granite surmounted by a bronze figure of an infantryman. The monument stands 17 feet 6 inches high and was designed and built by Badger Brothers of Quincy MA.<sup>xviii</sup>
- Samuel B. Rogers donated the \$2,000 to construct the Monument.<sup>xix</sup>

# World War I Monument

## Location:

Grinnell Park

Corner of Concord Road and Hudson Road, Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

Between 1936-1938<sup>xx</sup>

## Commemorates:

The Monument honors the 1 Sudbury man who died and the other 31 Sudbury men who fought in World War I (1917-1918).<sup>xxi</sup>

## Other Facts:

- The Monument is a large rustic boulder with a plaque affixed to the front made of green stone of unknown origin.
- The Town originally approved the creation of the Monument in 1920 but it was not completed until 1937 at a cost of \$3,514.<sup>xxiii</sup>

# World War II Monument

## Dedicated:

Monday, July 5, 1954 at 10:30 am

## Commemorates:

The World War II Monument honors the 8 Sudbury men who died and the other 187 Sudbury men and women who fought in World War II (1939-1945).<sup>xxiv</sup>

## Inscription:

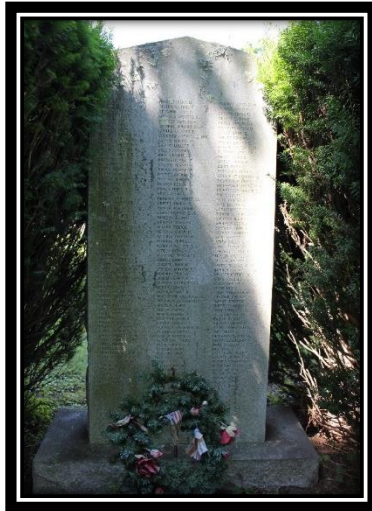

## **Other Facts:**

- The Monument consists of a granite shaft that stands 6 feet 6 inches above a one foot thick base. The Monument was designed and constructed by the Acton Monument Co.<sup>xxv</sup>
- The Monument cost \$2,600 and was funded by the Town in 1954<sup>xxvi</sup>
- The land the Monument is erected on was donated by Herbert L. Newton. The flagpole was a gift to the Town from M. Granville Haley while the flag was a gift from the family of Soldier Leo T. Quinn who died during WWII.<sup>xxvii</sup>
- A temporary honor roll of Sudbury residents who served in WWII was located in Sudbury Center near the Revolutionary War Monument until 1954 when the permanent Monument was erected.<sup>xxviii</sup>

# Korean Conflict Monument

## Location:

Wadsworth Cemetery  
Concord Road, Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

Monday, May 30, 1983 (Memorial Day)

## Commemorates:

The Korean Monument honors the more than 250 Sudbury men who served in the Korean Conflict (1950 –1953).<sup>xxix</sup>

## Inscription:

THIS MEMORIAL HONORS THOSE  
RESIDENTS OF SUDBURY  
WHO SERVED IN THE KOREAN  
CONFLICT  
1950-1953

## Other Facts:

- The Korean Monument is to the right of the World War II Monument at the entrance of Wadsworth Cemetery.
- The Korean Monument was erected in 1982 with the assistance of Col. Paul Leahy, the Town's Veterans' Affairs Officer. The Monument was dedicated the following Memorial Day.
- It appears that at least 1 Sudbury resident died in Korea. Sergeant Thomas Mallery was killed on March 28, 1953 at the age of 22.<sup>xxx</sup>

# Vietnam Conflict Monument

Wadsworth Cemetery  
Concord Road, Sudbury MA

**Dedicated:**

Monday, May 30, 1983 (Memorial Day)

**Commemorates:**

The Vietnam Monument honors Sudbury residents who served in the Vietnam Conflict (1964-1975)

**Inscription:**

THIS MEMORIAL HONORS THOSE  
RESIDENTS OF SUDBURY  
WHO SERVED IN THE VIETNAM  
CONFLICT  
1964-1975

**Other Facts:**

- The Vietnam Monument is to the left of the World War II Monument at the entrance of Wadsworth Cemetery.
- Like the Korean Monument, the Vietnam Monument was erected in 1982 with the assistance of Col. Paul Leahy, the Town's Veterans' Affairs Officer and was dedicated on the following Memorial Day.
- It appears that at least 1 Sudbury resident died in Vietnam. First Lieutenant Richard Leo Rogers was killed December 14, 1968 at the age of 22.<sup>xxxi</sup>

# September 11<sup>th</sup> Memorial

## Location:

Heritage Park  
Corner of Old Sudbury Road (Route 27) and Concord Road,  
Sudbury MA

## Dedicated:

Thursday, September 11, 2003

## Commemorates:

The September 11<sup>th</sup> Memorial honors all those that died on September 11, 2001 including Sudbury residents Geoffrey Cloud, Peter Goodrich and Cora Holland.

## Inscription:

### SEPTEMBER 11 MEMORIAL GARDEN

*"Each of us was reminded that we are here only for a time, and these counted days should be filled with things that last and matter: love for our families, love for our neighbors and for our country, gratitude for life . . ."*

On September 11, 2001, the United States of America came under terrorist attack. 3,025<sup>xxxii</sup> innocent people were killed in New York, Pennsylvania, and Washington, D.C.

Among those lost were Sudbury residents Geoffrey Cloud, Peter Morgan Goodrich, and Cora Hidalgo Holland. Our Community dedicates this Garden to their memory, and to the memory of all who perished on that September day.

May visitors to this Memorial, with its center stone of Sudbury granite, find comfort and peace.

There are 3 additional Plaques on the sides of the stone for Geoffrey, Peter and Cora.
